**Explanatory Note for USDA Agricultural Research Service (ARS) Report
November 5, 2010**

Please find enclosed the October 2010 ARS ARRA 1609 Report for the Agricultural Research Service, Department of Agriculture. This report reflects the NEPA status and progress for all ARS ARRA funded projects and activities through September 30, 2010.

ARS increased its obligation total by \$63,828,667 over last Quarter's report. With the exception of the obligation total, this report has not changed from the last quarterly report (July 2010). In summary, all NEPA reviews were completed by December 15, 2009 for the 38 ARS ARRA originally-funded projects and activities. Due to favorable bids on some of the projects, ARS was able to fund three additional critical deferred maintenance projects. These projects were added to the July 2010 ARS ARRA 1609 Report. One project was for critical deferred maintenance of the mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems of Building 306 at the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center (BARC), Beltsville, Maryland (see Row 39). The NEPA review for Building 306 was completed on May 5, 2010. The other two projects were not subject to NEPA. They involve minor operational changes to ensure the facilities operate in accordance with design intent and optimal efficiency. One facility is located in Poplarville, Mississippi; the other in Beltsville, Maryland (BARC-Building 010A). No entries were made for those two projects on page 2 of the ARS ARRA 1609 Report.

Page 1 of the ARS report indicates an obligation total of \$171,046,456 reported to OMB which differs from the total available funds reported on Recovery.gov. Perhaps the difference could be that the Agency data on Recovery.gov was last updated on September 17, 2010.

Because all ARRA funded projects are critical deferred maintenance projects, benefits provided by the NEPA analysis would not be applicable. Nonetheless, the most energy-efficient equipment will be obtained to replace the old equipment.
